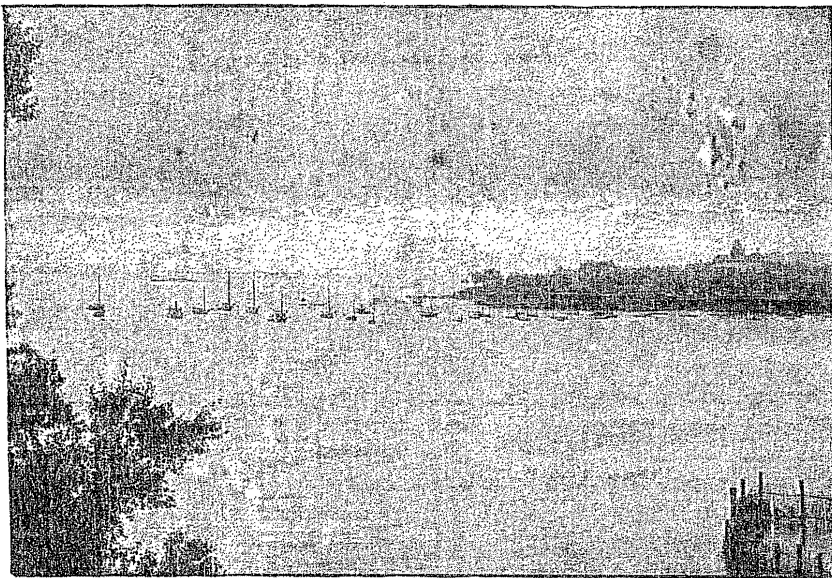
SUNDAY MORNING AT NORTHPORT.

Last Sunday, Aug. 2, was a glorious morning on Penobscot's shores, followed by a day so fine as to be worthy of record as the most beautiful of the season. A fine morning at Northport during the seaside season cannot be surpassed at any resort on the coast of Maine, and that means all that need be said on the subject, for those who are "traveled" and ought to know, tell us Maine air, and skies, and views, equal the world, and last Sabbath morning was the season's specimen.

As the grey of dawn grew discernible in the east, and later the pink and fire

of humanity flow down towards the centre, the wharf, and greet the great boat as she comes slowly and gracefully into her landing. It is the event of Sunday morning. A brief stop; the bell strikes; "all aboard" sounds out upon the air; the plank is hauled in, and the steamer passes on to her up river destination.

At 10:30 the bell at the altar in the "circle" calls for religious services in the auditorium, and soon a goodly audience has gathered in "God's first temple" to do homage to Him who "holdeth all in the hollow of his hand." Vocal music steals softly and pleasantly out from beneath the foliage followed by earnest

slanting rays of sunlight glinted across the bay, Northport lay in quietude. Later on come signs of life and activity. Breakfast over there is a period of quiet until a little after nine A. M. when the hoarse booming whistle of the steamer Katahdin is heard away down by the bluff, which is a signal for a general waking up and movement especially on the part of the young folks. AROUND PENOBSCOT BAY.

Belfast,

At the head of the bay is the largest place on its shores and is one of the prettiest of the small New England cities. Nicely shaded streets, beautiful drives, safe sailing and boating make it a pleasant place. Its fine new hotel, the Crosby Inn, possesses all the requirements of a first-class summer hotel. The city's location is high and airy, drainage perfect, everything around clean, new, and nice. Belfast is in communication several times daily, east west, north and south, by rail and by several steamer lines.

Northport.

Our own Northport is one of the brightest and fairest jewels in Penobscot's crown, with its miles of verdure, shady shores crowned with beautiful cottages, and backed by Mt. Percival, from which can be obtained views beyond comparison. For pure air, cooling breezes, welcome shade, bracing and invigorating sea breezes, and all the natural charms that go to make up the ideal seaside vacation summer resort for the people, Northport bears off the palm. Its fine new hotel, the Northport, just opened, and under charge of Geo. H. Bemis, and its cosy little hotels, boarding-houses and cottages are within the reach of all. The means of communication are superior, as the huge Boston steamers touch twice daily, the bay and river steamers, and the island steamers twice each day, and the M. C. R. R. station is at Belfast only a short distance away, so that visitors and cottagers can come and go at pleasure.

Searsport, and Fort Point.

The former is a pretty shore village, at the head of the bay, with the fine hotel, the Searsport House, by Wm. E. Grinnell, where many vacationists and summer visitors are to be found annually, and Fort Point is the peninsula at the mouth of Penobscot river jutting into the bay.

Castine

Is on the east side of the bay, and is noted for its peaceful, quiet calmness in the midst of this life of turmoil. It is on the Bar Harbor route of steamers.

Is an island midway the bay, and has a number of summer cottages, good hotels, and steamers touch daily.

Thus is Penobscot Bay encircled by pretty villages, hamlets, campgrounds, groves, points, nooks, beaches, &c., where the seeker for health, quiet, pleasure or recreation can find his desires satisfied, and with the growth of summer travel to our State, is destined to become one of the leading summer resorts for which Maine is famous.

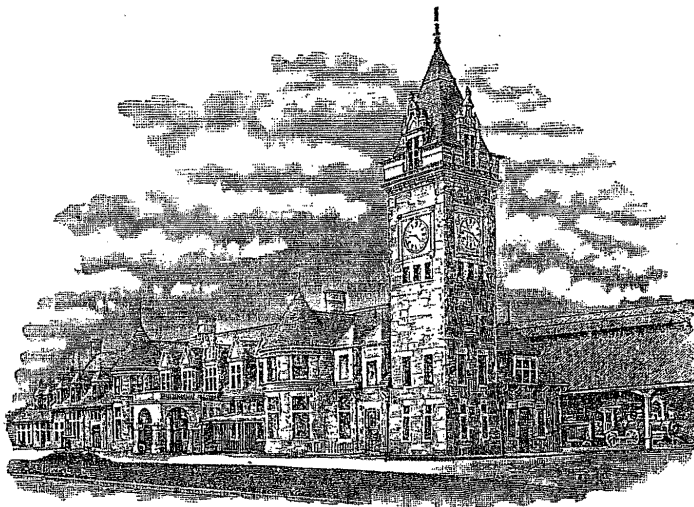

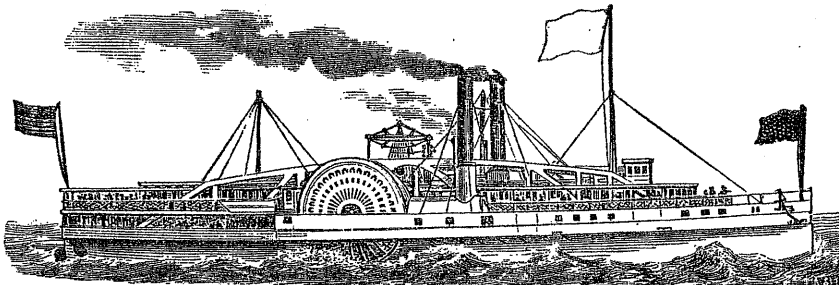

OUR ELECTRIC ROAD.

Not this year friends, but next season, we hope. The Belfast Street Railway Co., say they mean business; if so we all say amen—if not so much the worse for them and us. This is how the matter stands:—At last Monday's meeting of the Belfast city government the Co. represented that owing to delay in obtaining leave to lay its track in Northport and to other circumstances beyond its control, the expenditures of fifty per cent. of the cost of constructing its road before the first day of September, 1891, as required will be impracticable; that a petition for approval of location, accompanied with a map and estimate prepared by an engineer, is to be at once presented to the Railroad Commissioners, who will give a hearing during the present month; that immediately upon the extension of the time as herein requested, the company will begin the building of the power plant for operation of the road; that the company also intends to contract for its rails, ties, and poles needed, and to have the same delivered along the proposed line during the winter, in order that the work may be commenced early in the spring; that the capital stock of the road is all subscribed for in good faith, and it is the intention to have the road equipped and in working order not later than June 1, 1892. The city amended the requirement so the Co. will be allowed until May 1, 1892 in which to expend half the cost as above. The indications seem to be that the road will be built and cars running in time for next year's seaside season.

The largest excursion of the season from the interior towns to Northport has been arranged by the M. C. R. R., for Tuesday, Aug. 18th, from Waterville, Dover, Foxcroft and intermediate points to Northport via Belfast. Very low rates will prevail, and no effort will be spared to make this the great event of its kind this season. The Waterville Military Band is engaged for the day, and there will be a grand open air concert at the Grounds, where Prof. Hall will be heard in his brilliant cornet solos. The excursionists will have about six hours here. Connection will be made at Belfast for the Grounds by steamer Electa. This comes at an opportune date as campmeeting will be ended, and everything in readiness to take care of the crowd. Come over and see us.

Anent buckboards, the Old Orchard *Sea Shell* makes note of the appearance of one at that resort, as an agreeable innovation. Another exchange speaks of one with three horses abreast. 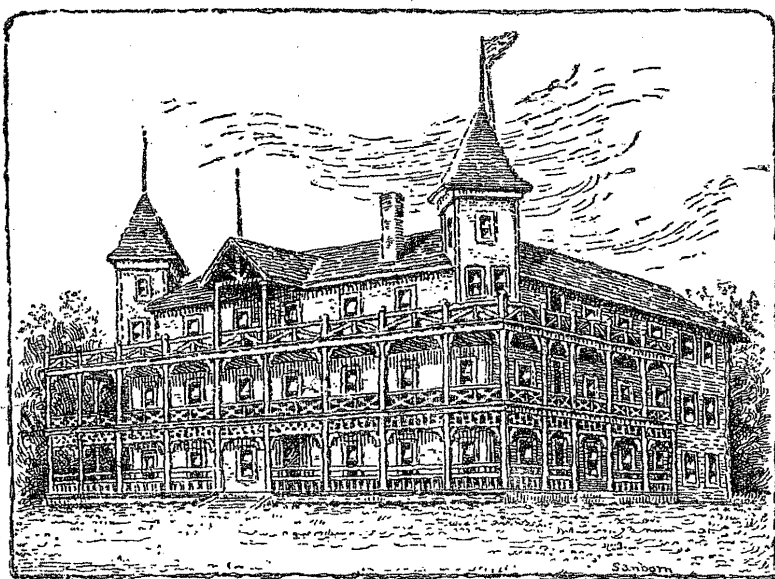

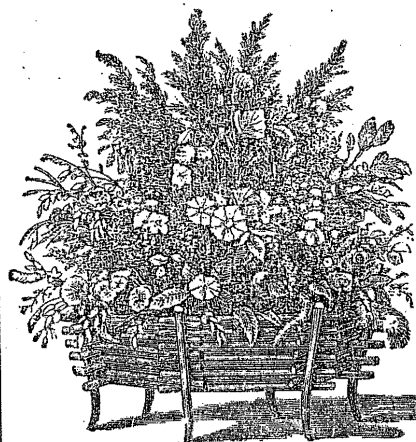
