Northport.



### COTTAGE FURNISHING.

The following from an exchange gives some hints on a cheap and tasty method of obtaining some furnishings for summer seaside cottages. Many of our Northport summer residents who have had years of experience could no doubt add many an item of value to the uninitiated, on the same subject. The columns of the SEA BREEZE are open for any who wish to let their light shine in this direction.

Many people who hire or buy summer cottages are troubled about the furnishing that is imperative for the season, but the trouble of removing heavy articles of furniture deter-

ports the cheese cloth drapery, confined on either side by large bows of ribbon. The kitchen, fitted with its cooking table and the best of oil stoves, can be brightened by Japanese paper draperies at the windows, fancy lace paper over the mantel, bright fans over the wall space and pretty draperies, duplicating those at the window, over impromptu hanging shelves that can be made of shallow boxes arranged on hooks against the wall. In the sleeping rooms toilet tables and washstands can be made by using an empty barrel for the foundation with a cover of square board, which should be covered plainly with chintz over the top and furnished with a full, deep curtain of

them from the comfort of complete furnishing. One of the most comfortable and cheerful cottages for summer can be furnished in a novel manner by arranging home-made articles of furnishing. The parlor has a painted floor, the center of which is covered by a Woodstock carpet, or fancy matting held to the floor surface by flat-headed gilt nails; chairs too old and unsightly for use are cushioned and covered with chintz, divans are made of square boxes and finished by large, square pillows at the back, square hassocks made of soap boxes are covered with the same chintz. A three-sided catchall, mounted on canes, is a receptacle for fancy work. A pretty screen, made upon a clotheshorse frame, will divide the room space, and the windows can be screened by opaque curtains and draperies of cheese-cloth or Madras. The dining-room has the same floor treatment; a sideboard made of a large packing box, fitted with shelves and covered with delicate chintz in light tone, square boxes fitted beneath every window and draped, the windows surmounted by an oval shelf that sup-

ports the cheese cloth drapery, confined on either side by large bows of ribbon. The kitchen, fitted with its cooking table and the best of oil stoves, can be brightened by Japanese paper draperies at the windows, fancy lace paper over the mantel, bright fans over the wall space and pretty draperies, duplicating those at the window, over impromptu hanging shelves that can be made of shallow boxes arranged on hooks against the wall. In the sleeping rooms toilet tables and washstands can be made by using an empty barrel for the foundation with a cover of square board, which should be covered plainly with chintz over the top and furnished with a full, deep curtain of chintz that reaches to the floor; draperies of cheese cloth above the toilet table at the windows should be held by bands of cretonne and ribbon. Packing boxes can be made comfortable and pretty couches and ornamented fans converted into wall pockets, plaques, screens and toilet cases. Bedding and dishes will thus be all requiring transportation, as cheap cottage bedsteads can be bought for \$2, and thus with a little work and very little money a pretty summer house is obtained which has all the essentials of health, cleanliness and comfort. A large Japanese umbrella placed before the door makes a good, quiet, shady spot for baby's nap, and striped awning shutters inside the piazza pane makes an additional room for afternoon naps or five o'clock tea. Fifty dollars covers the cost of eight rooms, floor covering included, in this antique, aesthetic fashion.

**ABOUT NORTHPORT.**

**HISTORICAL AND DESCRIPTIVE.**

It is but a few years since our quiet, cozy, pleasant, little seaside resort at Northport, where old ocean rolls in his waves at our feet, and the cooling breezes sigh through shady groves on the shores of the grand old Penobscot bay, was little more than an unbroken wilderness.

In 1848 the East Maine Methodist C. M. Association located here, purchasing 25 acres of land. In August, 1849, the first Camp-meeting was held here, and for nearly twenty-five years it was occupied only a week each year for meetings, with no indication that it would ever become a popular summer resort.

But with the growing fashion for spending summer vacations at the seaside, the attention of the people in this section of the State was turned toward Northport, as a desirable place for summer residences. The pioneer cottage was built in 1869, and several purchases of land have been made since, and the whole is enclosed under the Society's control.

As the place became better known, and its attractions of pure air, cleanliness, quietude and all other virtues which go to make up a pleasant and needful place of resort, were fully understood, it began to grow, and during the past five years it has become so thickly studded with cottages as to resemble a village, while all along the shore, on either side of the Grounds, the movement has kept pace, and the shore, almost from Belfast city to several miles beyond the Grounds, is thickly dotted with cottages of summer residents, many of them being costly and valuable as well as stylish. There are 175 cottages on and in the immediate vicinity of the Grounds, more being built annually.

Real estate has increased in value wonderfully, until what was supposed and valued as the poorest part of Northport is the most valuable and pays the most taxes.

The view from the Grounds seaward and from the cottages along the shore is beautiful, for the whole broad expanse of Penobscot Bay lies before us—a bay which travelers say rivals the far-famed Bay of Naples, dotted here and there with the white sails of lumber-laden vessels from Bangor, or swift flying sail-boats, and daily with majestic steamers plowing past and sending billowy, surfy waves breaking with hollow roar against the shore, while at the south the islands stand guard to keep out the rough Atlantic storms. Across to eastward is the village of Castine, ancient historical and modern educational ground, while at the north lies Brigadier's Island and the villages of Stockton and Searsport, with the spires and harbor of Belfast in the near distance.

The facilities for recreation are fine. There is good bathing and rowing, and fine drives in the neighborhood, Belfast being near and Mt. Percival or the Bluff only a mile off, from which can be obtained a splendid view of the scenery in the neighborhood; the sailing is safe and roomy, and the fishing privileges fine within a stone's throw of the shore.

One of the greatest advantages of Northport, as a summer resort, is the location and conveniences for reaching and leaving here at short notice. The Boston boats touch at the wharf daily to and from Boston and intermediate landings to Bangor. Small steamers ply daily to and from Bangor, Belfast, Castine and Islesboro, while hacks connect with the Me. Central R. R. at Belfast, a short distance up shore, from where trains leave twice a day for all parts of the country.

### THE NEW SHORE ROAD.

Agreeably to the request of a large number of petitioners for a new road to commence at the termination of So. Shore avenue and continue along shore around the Bluff to Saturday Cove, the Co. Commissioners have viewed the route and will report at their next regular meeting. It is understood they are favorably inclined, but there is some opposition, principally from citizens living in the Western part of the town, and their remonstrance must be heard before the matter can be definitely settled.

The road will undoubtedly be built—it is only a question of time—and it is much to be regretted that it cannot be located at once, and constructed the coming autumn. If built within a reasonable time, say this autumn or next spring, it ensures the success of Northport as a summer resort for ten years at least, and that means, of course, the financial prosperity of the town of Northport.

To us it is one of the unaccountable things that a citizen of Northport should oppose the building of this road on account of the cost to the town, when it must be plain to the dullest comprehension that it would be money invested at the best possible rates. When the road is built money will at once be invested all along its route in cottages, buildings and improvements, and the real estate which is now the poorest in town, will appreciate 50 per cent. in value, and thus the additional taxes collected in a few years will of itself pay for the expense of the road, which we learn is estimated to be less than three thousand dollars.

With the example before them of what the non-resident taxpayers have done for the town, it would seem as tho' the citizens would be more than anxious to continue such benefits. We understand about \$1,000 of the town's debt has been paid almost wholly by the taxes collected from non-residents, and the whole expense therefor was some \$140 for building So. Shore avenue.

It will be a grand thing for the Northport taxpayers to have the road constructed, and we have no doubt at all but it will be done, but the delay caused by factious opposition is vexatious and to some extent injurious.

Less than five years will see the Bluff shore and all its eligible locations on the shore, from Breezy Point, So. Shore, to Saturday Cove, lined with summer cottages, and many thousands of dollars of tax paying property will be added to and brought into the town.

We have faith in Maine as the great center for the summer travel of the Eastern U. S., and we have faith in Northport as one of the smaller centers to which that tidal wave will tend, and we regret that anything should be done or left undone, which shall injure or retard its progress and growth.

A three masted schooner is expected to be launched from J. Y. Cottrell's yard, Belfast, at high water next Wednesday. She is rigged and on the stocks in full view from the wharf here and along shore, and though three miles away the launch can be seen very plainly with the unassisted vision, while glasses will give a very fine view as she glides into her element. Look out.

The ratio of taxation this year is 17 1-2 mills per dollar. Twenty-five per cent. discount is allowed on highway tax if paid in cash soon.



A short distance below the Grounds beyond the Bluff in Northport, is a little cove or inlet of Penobscot Bay, where is situated one of the smallest, most quiet, pretty and romantic little settlements of the scores of similar kind to be found on the shores of Maine. It is known as Saturday Cove, and for years it has been the summer resort of small parties from the West who have found the quiet, pure air, and rest they sought, beneath the shade of its hospitable roofs.

### BAR HARBOR.

A correspondent writes:—The season thus far has proved exceptionally cold, with almost constantly prevailing fogs, the latter in lieu of the frequent rains which have visited the mountains and the greater part of New England. The "season" is decidedly backward and the tide of travel has but just begun. The cottages are filling rapidly, and the hotels are taking a start. Within the last two years great changes have taken place at Bar Harbor. Hotel room has multiplied greatly, and cottages have been added until populated sections now appear where, until within a short time, the wildest and most natural conditions prevailed. This matter of cottage establishment has largely affected the summer business of the island. Many of the former best patrons of the hotels here are now the proprietors or residents of cottages, and their secession from the hotels, just at the time when the latter have been enlarged and remodelled, has somewhat influenced hotel interests. However, the volume of travel sets steadily and increasingly in the direction of Mt. Desert.

The cottage establishment is a fixture, and its population will remain a permanency. Great sums of money, considering the locality, have been lavished upon this class of property, and it can never be lightly abandoned. The owners and residents are largely Bostonians, and the buildings and estates are most elaborate in design, equipment and ornamentation. A change has also taken place in the habits and customs of the cottagers. Formerly these all took their meals at the hotels, their servants and domestic establishments being largely left at home, and the "haulmealers" and "trot-mealers" represented institutions readily recognized in Bar Harbor. At present these conditions are reversed; many cottages have been enlarged by the addition of kitchen and dining departments, while the new buildings have been designed with this end in view and the result is the isolation of the cottage population, and their entire independence of the hotels.
